Assam: Miss World Japan set to make tour in the region



Guwahati, June 5, 2017: Miss World Japan-2016, Priyanka Yoshikawa, will be travelling from the land of 'Sakuras' to the home of the one-horned rhinoceros, Assam, to participate in the Eastern Himalayan Naturenomics Forum-2017 on November 2 and 3.

Priyanka has been a role model for Young Japan and Young India for representing the rich bio-cultural heritage of both the nations with pride and will be delivering the sub keynote address at the forum to evangelize 'Community Conservation and Social Mobility.' Priyanka will be visiting the Eastern Himalayan Botanic Ark, a biodiverse haven of the Eastern Himalayas, which has been nurtured and grown by botany villages that live around the Ark.

A half-Japanese and a half-Indian, Priyanka calls herself 'Indian at heart.' Proud of the picturesque heritage of Japan, she is equally excited about her visit to India and celebrate the diversity of nature, arts, history and culture with its people. She will be travelling through Assam from November 1 to 5, supported by Balipara Foundation and has been invited by Ranjit Barthakur, founder trustee of Balipara Foundation, founder of the Eastern Himalayan Naturenomics Forum and Elephant Country – a global brand which synergises community and elephant conservation efforts.

She is also the brand ambassador for 'Me for the World' charity savings bank box, an innovative concept that encourages children to save for themselves and give back to global communities. During her visit, she will be visiting schools to interact with children and inspiring the next generation through charity and compassion.
