### **Student Dies** Electrocuted **Assam Rising**

Guwahati, June 25

A 14-year-old Class 8 student, Goumchar Narzary of Ashrabari village in Assam's Chirang district, tragically died of electrocution while cutting bamboo near his home. The incident occurred after a bamboo pole accidentally came into contact with a high-voltage electric line. Goumchar had just returned from his examination at Vidyalaya, Adarsha Samthaibari when the mishap took place. Family members rushed him to JBS Civil Hospital in Kajalgaon, where doctors declared him brought dead. The sudden death of the young boy has plunged the local community into deep sorrow, with neighbours and classmates mourning the loss. Local authorities are being urged to raise awareness about safety near live electric lines. A case has been registered and further investigation is underway.



### **Border Dispute Escalates**

Tension flared at the Assam-Meghalaya border on Wednesday after over 400 protestors from Meghalaya uprooted saplings and dismantled temporary structures during a plantation drive by Assam's Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council (KAAC) in Lapangap village. The hill where the drive took place is claimed by both Assam's Karbi Anglong and Meghalaya's West Jaintia Hills, making it a longdisputed area. Members of the Khasi Students' Union (KSU) alleged Assam's encroachment. Assam Police reportedly fired tear gas to control the mob. Meghalaya officials criticized Assam for not notifying about the activity. A peace meeting originally scheduled was postponed after Assam officials didn't arrive. Speaking on the occasion, Dr. Sarma stated that it is imperative for the new generation of India to commemorate the Emergency every year to ensure that such events are never repeated. He emphasised that it is the responsibility of the youth to understand and reflect upon the widespread atrocities committed during the 21 months of the Emergency. Referring to the proclamation of Emergency on 25 June 1975 without cabinet approval, he remarked that it inflicted a severe blow to the nation's conscience. He further pointed out that the Supreme Court's judgement during the Emergency allowed even the suspension of Article 21, which guarantees the right to life and personal liberty, thereby enabling the government to arrest and detain individuals without judicial oversight and absolving the state of accountability even in cases of custodial deaths. The Chief Minister highlighted that the Shah Commission Report and various historical documents related to that period are now publicly accessible and should be studied by the younger generation. He also stated that history demonstrates how, in times of chaos and oppression, conscientious groups and individuals have emerged in response. Citing the Navnirman Andolan in Gujarat as a significant movement against Indira Gandhi's regime, he said that it eventually expanded into a nationwide movement under the leadership of Jayaprakash Narayan. He further acknowledged leaders such as Morarji Desai, Bharat Ratna Atal Bihari Vajpayee, Lal Krishna Advani, George Fernandes, and Nanaji Deshmukh, who resisted the Emergency, endured imprisonment, and ultimately compelled Indira Gandhi to withdraw the Emergency. Dr. Sarma expressed hope that during this Mock Parliament, participants would reflect on the fact that the Emergency lacked both legal and moral justification. He also recalled that numerous individuals made significant sacrifices to end the Emergency and restore democracy in the country, with leaders from the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh (RSS) and the Jan Sangh playing a vital role in countering Indira Gandhi's authoritarianism. Referring to a leader from that era who had sworn to protect the Constitution, the Chief Minister remarked that it was the same individual's family that subsequently imposed the Emergency. He noted that, unlike other instances in history where perpetrators expressed regret - such as the British over the Jallianwala Bagh massacre or U.S. Presidents visiting Hiroshima to acknowledge the atomic bombings - the Congress party has never issued an apology for the Emergency. He concluded by stating that the party responsible should apologise to the nation for undermining its democratic values and should pledge that such an event would never be repeated in the future. Assam State President of the Bharatiya Janata Party and MP Dilip Saikia, State President of the Bharatiya Janata Yuva Morcha Rakesh Das, State President of the BJP Mahila Morcha Swapna Bania, along with several party officials and other dignitaries, also took part in the Mock Parliament.

well-planned and targeted strike on the security forces stationed at the camp. The sudden blast caused panic among nearby residents and triggered an immediate response from both Assam Police and CRPF personnel. The three injured officers have been identified as:Siddhartha Borbora,Sushil Bhumij,Mintu Hazarika.All three suffered serious injuries and were swiftly transported to the Bokakhat Civil Hospital, where they are currently receiving medical care. Their condition is reported to be stable, but further medical evaluations are ongoing. Following the attack, security forces, led by the Sub-Divisional Police Officer (SDPO), launched a large-scale search operation across Bokakhat and surrounding areas. A high alert has been declared in the region, and checkpoints have been set up to monitor vehicle movement and track down the culprits. Though no group has claimed responsibility for the attack so far, officials are not ruling out any possibilities, including links to insurgent or extremist elements. The motive behind the assault remains unclear, and a thorough investigation is currently underway. Senior police officials have assured that no effort will be spared in identifying and apprehending those behind the act. Forensic teams have also reached the site to collect evidence that may aid in tracking the attackers. This incident has raised concerns about security vulnerabilities in the region and may lead to enhanced deployment and vigilance in sensitive zones across Assam. Authorities have urged citizens to remain calm but vigilant, and to report any suspicious activity as the investigation into the grenade blast continues. Speaking to the media, SP Rajen Singh ruled out the involvement of extremist groups. Instead, he hinted at the possibility that frustrated poachers or local criminals might have been behind the attack. He cited the recent crackdown on wildlife and narcotics crime in the region as a possible motive.Golaghat police have intensified their operations in recent months, arresting over 50 poachers, conducting two encounter operations, and recovering several arms, including AK-47 and AK-56 rifles. Their efforts have also thwarted more than 10 attempts at rhino poaching. In addition, the police have taken a strong stance against drug networks in the district. Authorities believe this sustained pressure may have provoked a retaliatory act from the underworld. Though the exact cause and perpetrators behind the blast are yet to be confirmed, SP Singh stated that investigations are progressing rapidly, and he is hopeful of a breakthrough soon.Cabinet Minister Atul Bora also visited the injured personnel at the hospital and assured them of the government's support. He reiterated the Assam government's zero-tolerance policy against terrorism and criminal activities under Chief Minister Dr. Himanta Biswa Sarma's leadership.Personnel on duty at the camp told the press that had the explosion occurred under normal circumstances, it could have resulted in heavy casualties. The blast not only injured Assam Police personnel but also caused damage to nearby civilian homes, uprooting furniture and destroying cooking items. Local residents, unaccustomed to such violence, have been left shaken and are now living in fear and anxiety.

# Days after US strikes, Iran confirms

a proposal that would effectively stop the country's cooperation with the International Atomic Energy Agency, the Vienna-based UN watchdog that has been monitoring the Iranian nuclear program for years. Ahead of the vote, Iranian Parliament Speaker Mohammad Bagher Qalibaf criticised the IAEA for having "refused to even pretend to condemn the attack on Iran's nuclear facilities" that were carried out by the United States on Sunday."For this reason, the Atomic Energy Organisation of Iran will suspend cooperation with the IAEA until security of nuclear facilities is ensured, and Iran's peaceful nuclear program will move forward at a faster pace," Qalibaf told .In Vienna, IAEA Director General Rafael Mariano Grossi said he had already written to Iran to discuss resuming inspections of their nuclear facilities. Among other things, Iran claims to have moved its highly enriched uranium ahead of the American strikes and Grossi said his inspectors needed to reassess the country's stockpiles. The American strikes hit three Iranian nuclear sites, which Trump said had "completely and fully obliterated" the country's nuclear program. From Tehran, Iran's Foreign Ministry spokesman, Esmail Baghaei, confirmed that the strikes on Sunday by American B-2 bombers using bunker-buster bombs had caused significant damage." Indian Railways announces fare increase in suburban train fares and Monthly Season Ticket (MST) prices.Ordinary second-class fare for journeys up to 500 km remains unchanged.For ordinary second-class travel beyond 500 km, fare will rise by 0.5 paise per km.Non-AC Mail/Express trains to see a 1 paise per km hike.All AC classes will face a 2 paise per km increase.This measured fare revision is expected to generate crucial revenue for infrastructure and service enhancements without burdening short-distance or frequent travelers. In a parallel move to enhance transparency and prevent misuse of the Tatkal booking system, the Ministry of Railways has mandated Aadhaar authentication for booking Tatkal tickets starting July 1, 2025.Under the new rule, only users with verified Aadhaar identities will be permitted to book Tatkal tickets through the IRCTC website and mobile app. Additionally, Aadhaar-based OTP verification will be implemented from July 15 to reinforce the measure. In a bid to curb malpractices by intermediaries, IRCTC-authorised agents have been restricted from booking Tatkal tickets during the crucial first 30 minutes of the booking window: AC Tatkal bookings: Agents barred from 10:00 am to 10:30 am, Non-AC Tatkal bookings: Agents barred from 11:00 am to 11:30 am. The Centre for Railway Information Systems (CRIS) has been tasked with updating the booking platform to reflect these changes and ensure compliance across all railway zones. These sweeping reforms underscore the Railways' commitment to providing a more secure, transparent, and passenger-friendly system while balancing the need for operational sustainability.

# Capping operations progress amid

significant development, a 200-tonne capacity crane was deployed to the site to assist in extracting the rig pipes. A team of foreign technical experts, including specialists from the U.S., is spearheading the operation. If successful, the next critical phase will involve lowering the rig structure and beginning the capping process, aimed at sealing the leak and ending the crisis. Meanwhile, frustration is mounting among locals. Krishna Agarwal, the proprietor of SK Petro Services, a private contractor associated with the operation, has not visited the site or met affected families, drawing sharp criticism from residents. His absence has been widely condemned as insensitive and negligent. Environmental concerns have also surfaced. Locals and activists have alleged that ONGC failed to produce a pollution clearance certificate for the site. This has triggered calls for an independent probe into the role of the Sivasagar Pollution Control Board, accusing it of lax oversight that may have contributed to the ongoing crisis. Initially, around 75 families were directly impacted by the leak. However, the affected population has now surged to over 3,000 individuals, as toxic emissions and emergency evacuations expanded beyond the immediate vicinity. In a recent public advisory, ONGC stated that it is now safe for residents beyond 500 meters of the leak site to return home. According to their scientific assessment, hydrocarbons are no longer detectable beyond 30 meters, marking what they termed a "positive development." Gas pressure from the well has reportedly decreased, improving conditions for capping. ONGC teams continue to perform 'water blanketing' operations to suppress fire risks and stabilize the area. Despite cautious progress, Bhatiapar's residents remain wary, demanding compensation, accountability, and long-term safety assurances from both ONGC and regulatory bodies.

# Assam Govt empowers District

upon an earlier order dated February 23, 2016 (No. SWD.96/2004/198) and grants DCPOs the authority under Section 16 of the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act (PCMA), 2006. With this empowerment, DCPOs will now be responsible for proactively identifying, preventing, and taking legal action against cases of child marriage in their respective districts. As per the notification, the appointed CMPOs will carry out duties detailed under Subsection 3 of Section 16 of the PCMA, which include: Preventing child marriages before they occur, gathering evidence for prosecution, educating the public about the legal and social implications of child marriage. In addition, these officers are directed to operate in alignment with Section 3 of the Assam Prohibition of Child Marriage Rules, 2015, as notified on November 2, 2015 (Notification No. SWD.96/ 04/192). The directive also authorizes CMPOs to file FIRs either under the PCMA, 2006 or the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act, 2012, as amended in 2019, depending on the nature of the case. This expanded role is expected to strengthen Assam's existing child protection framework. Previously, Gram Panchayat Secretaries in non-Sixth Schedule areas and Lat Mandals (Patwaries) in Sixth Schedule districts such as Dima Hasao were assigned similar responsibilities. The state government has emphasized the importance of coordination among CMPOs and other stakeholders, including law enforcement, social welfare departments, and grassroots organizations, to ensure a unified and effective response to the issue of child marriage. This latest measure signals the government's continued commitment to safeguarding children's rights and creating a secure, informed environment for youth across Assam.

In 2023–24, just five such operations were carried out, while the previous two years saw a total of eight searches. The year 2020-21 marked the peak in search activity, with 19 operations. Sources close to the investigations revealed that the recovered assets comprise cash, property documents, and digital evidence, exposing intricate layers of money laundering, shell companies, and tax fraud. Though the names of individuals and companies remain undisclosed due to legal constraints, insiders suggest the involvement of influential business figures, contractors, and politically exposed persons. Experts noted that despite these recoveries, the figures still fall behind those reported in more industrialized states. Nevertheless, officials believe that continued intelligence gathering and forensic tracking will lead to further crackdowns on hundreds of suspected entities still under scrutiny. Encouragingly, the investigations have also sparked a rise in voluntary tax compliance, particularly among small and medium-sized businesses and professionals - a development seen as a positive shift towards financial accountability in the region.

## Army inks deals worth Rs 295 crore

ordered small loitering munitions and mini surveillance drones in two contracts, collectively worth Rs 295 crore, from domestic private sector companies. The DRDO, on its part, has also offered 28 of its weapon systems to the three services for emergency procurements. They range from rockets, air-to-air missiles and airto-ground missiles to laserguided bombs, torpedoes and shoulder-fired air defence missiles, among others. Of the two contracts inked by the Army, the first is for around 450 Nagastra-1R loitering munitions or kamikaze drones, which are also capable of night operations, at a cost of Rs 158 crore from the Nagpur-based Solar Defence and Aerospace Ltd. The other deal is worth Rs 137 crore with ideaForge Technology for hybrid miniUAV (unmanned aerial vehicles) systems, variants of the Switch drones with VTOL (vertical take-off and landing) capabilities, for ISR (intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance) missions. Variants of the Nagastra and the UAVs with VTOL are already in the Army's inventory and were extensively used during the cross-border hostilities with Pakistan from May 7 to 10. The fresh orders have to be executed within a year. The Nagastra, with a 360-degree gimbal camera and the option of putting a thermal camera for night operations, comes with a highprecision targeting system.

Sources said his death was claimed by the TTP, also called the 'Pakistani Taliban'.roup Captain Varthaman, then a Wing Commander, became a national hero after shooting down a Pak F-16 fighter jet - in a generationolder MiG 21 - during aerial combat on February 27. Unfortunately, during the dogfight he flew over parts of Kashmir illegally occupied by Pakistan, and his plane was hit. The brave fighter pilot had to eject over territory controlled by the enemy.He was captured by the Pak Army and spent nearly 60 hours in enemy hands. Eventually Pak was forced to release him due to extensive pressure exerted by India and the global community.In November 2021 he was promoted to Group Captain and received the Vir Chakra. The Balakot airstrikes were India's response to the Pulwama terror attack, in which a security forces convoy was attacked by a suicide bomber driving a Maruti Suzuki Eeco van. The terrorist - later identified as Adil Ahmad Dir - had been trained by banned, Pak-based terror group Jaish-e-Mohammed. India's retaliatory airstrikes involved a dozen Mirage jets streaking 20km past the Line of Control and into Pakcontrolled territory to destroy JeM training camps.

While the government maintains that the goal is to protect the rights of indigenous Assamese communities, earlier eviction drives have drawn criticism from opposition parties and rights groups, citing humanitarian concerns and inadequate rehabilitation measures. The latest announcement signals a renewed and more vigorous phase in the state's land recovery mission. The administration's stand is expected to fuel debates surrounding identity, land ownership, and demographic shifts in Assam—a state that has long struggled with such complex socio-political dynamics. As the state gears up for the next phase of evictions, the issue is likely to remain at the forefront of political and public discourse in the days ahead.

This incident highlights the persistent threat posed by illegal wildlife trade and the urgent need for stronger enforcement and inter-state coordination to protect India's endangered species.

The celebration of the feminine divine, in all her raw and natural form, offers an alternative narrative to the often sanitized portrayal of goddesses in mainstream worship.

#### **Rituals and Practices**

During the three-day seclusion period, devotees observe strict austerities. Many fast, meditate, or engage after elaborate purification rites, (langars), and ashrams spring in prayer while refraining from

any kind of agricultural or sexual activity — an ancient acknowledgment of the Earth's and the Goddess's resting phase. Homes are cleaned, and women especially take time to honor their own bodies and natural cycles.On the reopening day, the 'Snan' (ritual bath) of the goddess is performed, and the temple is thrown open to a massive rush of pilgrims. The red cloth, believed to have absorbed the goddess's energy, is distributed to the faithful, considered to bring blessings, protection, and fertility. Though most Tantric rituals remain private, it is during Ambubachi that some are made semi-public — including fire sacrifices, invocation chants, and energy transference rituals offering a glimpse into the esoteric spiritual practices often hidden from the mainstream.

The Living Legacy

The Kamakhya Ambubachi Mela is a rare celebration that blends ancient Tantric philosophy, folk traditions, and societal norms into a single spiritual experience. It is a festival that venerates the body in its most natural form, embraces the cycles of the Earth and women alike, and honors the creative power of the feminine.For those who visit, it is more than a pilgrimage — it is a journey into the heart of India's mysticism, a place where the divine is not distant and abstract, but embodied, fertile, and powerfully alive.As society grapples with questions of gender, identity, and tradition, the Ambubachi Mela offers a symbolic and literal reminder that the divine feminine bleeds, rests, and rises again and in that cycle lies the essence of all creation.


